SPRITUAL, MORAL, SOCIAL & CULTURAL POLICY



Introduction

This policy covers our school's approach to delivering our social, moral, spiritual and cultural (SMSC) aspects of our curriculum which is integral to the wider development of our students so that they are well-equipped to grow and flourish in national and international society.

Our school takes our SMSC commitments very seriously as part of our whole-school curriculum and has obtained the Gold Award for the <u>SMSC Quality Mark</u> from the <u>Young Citizens</u> Awarding Body.

More broadly, our school strives to set the highest standards in our broader curriculum by welcoming in external specialists and assessors in order to evaluate our provision and support improvement. This is reflected in our <u>Holocaust Beacon School Status</u>, our <u>School Gardening Awards</u>, our <u>ArtsMark Status</u>, our <u>Online Safety Award and our Eco-School Status</u>.

Key Definitions

We define SMSC provision as follows;

Spiritual

The opportunity to explore beliefs, experience and faiths, feelings and values; enjoy learning about oneself, others and the surrounding world; use imagination and creativity and reflect on experiences.

Moral

The opportunity to learn what is right and wrong and respect the law; understand consequences; investigate moral and ethical issues and offer reasoned views.

Social

The opportunity to use a range of social skills to participate in the local community and beyond; appreciate diverse viewpoints; participate, volunteer and cooperate; resolve conflict.

Cultural

The opportunity to explore and appreciate cultural influences; appreciate the role of Britain's parliamentary system; participate in cultural opportunities; understand, accept, respect and celebrate diversity.

Intrinsically linked to our SMSC provision is our promotion of British Values which we define as follows:

Democracy

The recognition that we inhabit in a culture built upon freedom and equality, where everyone is aware of their rights and responsibilities.

The Rule of Law

The recognition that there is an essential need for rules which enables us to be happy, secure and safe in our living and working environment.

Individual Liberty

The recognition that we have a right and responsibility to uphold the protection of our own rights as well as the rights of others.

Mutual Respect

The recognition that we have a responsibility to respect others and a right receive that respect in return.

Tolerance of Different Faiths and Beliefs

The recognition that we may not all share the same beliefs and values, but that there is a responsibility to respect opposing values, ideas and beliefs, and an expectation not to impose our own thinking on others.

SMSC Provision

Our whole-school curriculum places SMSC provision centrally and is systematic in ensuring that all strands are covered with depth and range in order to facilitate, build on and apply an empathetic and informed awareness and understanding.

This SMSC provision is approached through three main strands:

1 - Focus Weeks

Our Focus Week programme carefully maps in SMSC - as well as British Values - into every theme and is updated annually to remain current and societally contextualised.

For example, the 2023-2024 programme focuses on the roles and responsibilities tied into the return to school from COVID lockdown; the promotion of respect in terms of moral, social and cultural implications of concepts such as #BLM and #MeToo; environmental awareness; and the individual and shared responsibilities to support spiritual and personal mental health and well-being.

The Focus Week programme is produced annually - see example below - and builds in a wide range of curricular aspects included SMSC, British Values, PSHE, etc:

Additionally, The Friary Ethic - Friendship / Responsibility / Independence / Aspiration / Resilience / You - is an integral part of school life and pastoral provision. It is the basis for the Year 8 Character Award which provides a structure for teaching and independent projects to develop the character necessary to operate in our school and within modern British society.

Furthermore, our extensive PHSE programme - which is both scheduled and discrete across our curriculum provision - covers a wide range of themes within the Focus Weeks which help to shape individual's SMSC identity and understanding.

3 - Subject Area Provision

All individual subject areas have a set responsibility to deliver and develop their SMSC and British Values provision in order to ensure the depth and range of provision is retained.

This is achieved and evaluated through annual audits by all subject areas which are reviewed and collated to maintain a full picture of provision.

These SMSC audits are similarly produced to review the coverage of British Values across all subject areas.

Monitoring & Development of SMSC

We ensure that SMSC - and related British Values - are carefully monitored to ensure strong delivery and that we work to continually improved and develop our provision.

The Focus Week programme is mapped out on an annual basis by the Headteacher and the PHSE Co-Ordinator and whole-school themes - designed to inter-connect with contemporary trends and principles - are identified to ensure the topics remain current and live. The Focus Weeks have a comprehensive scheme of work - though there is also the flexibility for leaders to additionally develop and enhance the provision independently.

The whole-school events programme is mapped in by the Headteacher and SLT Leadership & Management Lead and is cross-referenced to this policy to ensure consistent and sustained development of key SMSC principles and concepts.

The subject area provision is reviewed by the Headteacher and the SLT Quality of Education Lead on an annual basis to review provision and to build a dialogue on existing and development of SMSC practice.

Each year the school targets set SMSC-related objectives in order to maintain and develop provision further so that standards never remain static, are always kept fresh, and are always improving. For 2023-2024 the following priorities will be addressed:
